

PNS Siddique Attack: The Escalating Baloch Insurgency in Pakistan

On the night of 25 Mar 2024, PNS Siddique in Turbat, Balochistan, became the focal point of a high-profile assault. The attack, orchestrated by the Balochistan Liberation Army's (BLA) Majeed Brigade, highlighted the persistent insurgency challenges faced by Pakistan. The protracted exchange of heavy gunfire and explosions, lasting over three hours, underscored the intensity of the conflict.

- **Strategic Relevance of PNS Siddique:** PNS Siddique holds a strategic position within Pakistan's naval defence infrastructure, being the second-largest naval air base after PNS Mehran in Karachi. Its significance is amplified by its role in hosting Chinese drones, indicating the international ramifications of the assault.
- **The BLA's Calculated Offensive:** The assault is part of a series of targeted strikes by the BLA in 2024, including previous attacks in Mach and Gwadar. These locations are strategically chosen to disrupt administrative, economic, and military operations crucial to Pakistan and its alliances, particularly the China-Pakistan Economic Corridor (CPEC).
- **The Insurgency's Underpinnings:** The BLA's actions are rooted in longstanding grievances against Pakistan's central governance and the perceived exploitation of Baloch resources by foreign investments, especially Chinese. The group aims to internationalise their struggle and garner wider support through such high-profile attacks.
- **Pakistan's Multifaceted Challenge:** The surge in BLA activities in 2024 presents a multifaceted challenge for Pakistan, which is already grappling with internal political unrest, economic challenges, and delicate regional relations. The attack on PNS Siddique accentuates the need for an escalated security posture in Balochistan, a region prone to insurgency threats.
