



Strategic Implications of the Busan Summit 2023

On 26 Nov 2023, a pivotal diplomatic event occurred in Busan, South Korea, marking a significant turn in East Asian geopolitics. High-level diplomats — Chinese Foreign Minister Wang Yi, Japanese Foreign Minister Yoko Kamikawa, and South Korean Foreign Minister Park Jin — convened for their first in-person meeting since 2019 in this strategic port city.
